
Tips for Writing an Introduction

There are many different ways to write an introduction. Here are some methods:

- Make a Surprising Statement: Beginning with a startling statement or an interesting fact can stir your readers' curiosity about a subject.
- **Begin with a Quotation:** An interesting quotation can draw readers in and begin to shed light on your topic.
- Ask a Question: A question can tap into readers' own experiences or make them want to discover an answer.



- **Relate an Anecdote:** Beginning with an anecdote, or a brief story, can hook your readers and help you make a point in a dramatic way.
- Address the Reader: Speaking directly to your readers establishes a friendly, informal tone and involves readers in your topic.
